An international refugee crisis is unfolding before our eyes. Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children from Syria and parts of Iraq flee violence in their homeland, seeking safety in Europe. Many European nations have agreed to take in refugees, a handle the massive influx of people –

but some governments are not equipped to handle the massive influx of people – most carrying with them what's left of their worldly goods in one or two suitcases.

International aid organizations have responded. Along with federal governments, agencies such as United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) is taking the lead, setting up refugee camps and organizing aid and support.

Lions Clubs International is providing assistance as well.

- Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has provided grants to support refugee camps in Jordan and Lebanon.
- At the 2015 International Convention in Honolulu, we honoured Save The Children with our Humanitarian Award, providing US\$250,000 specifically for refugee camps inside Syria.
- International President Yamada has challenged Lions in all countries that have taken in refugees to contact their local and federal government to offer assistance.
- IP Yamada has also challenged Lions in other nations to contact Lions in the countries hosting refugees. There may be opportunities to provide support through international joint service projects.
- Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is accepting donations to a designated fund, the 'LCIF Refugees Fund' with donation being eligible for MJF/PMJF credits. Send your donation with cheques clearly marked 'LCIF Refugee Fund' to your District Cabinet Treasurer for banking into the LCIF account. 100% of every donated dollar goes in Grants to Lions Clubs at the coalface helping the refugees to rebuild their lives.

A solution to the Syrian refugee situation falls upon governments around the world to solve through diplomatic measures and mutual cooperation.

Until a solution is found, Lions are focused on the displaced refugees and how we, as Lions, can help provide basic necessities and bring dignity to those in need.

The McCusker Alzheimer's Research Foundation (MARF)

Dear Lions of Australia

It has now been just over a year since our Category B Project was launched at the Newcastle Convention and we would like to take this opportunity to say a very big **THANK YOU...**

Since we wrote to all of the clubs throughout Australia, a total amount of \$136,282, from 134 Lions Clubs, has been donated with many clubs making an ongoing commitment over the next 3 years. A great result so far, and we thank those clubs most sincerely for their donations and encourage the remaining clubs to hop on board.

Construction has commenced on the Neuro-Science building at the QE11 Medical Centre in Perth where the McCusker Alzheimer's Research Foundation will be located and the researchers are now focused on sourcing their scientific & research equipment. We have attached a list of the equipment required for your perusal, our goal is to raise the \$5Million required.

On the Research front, we have attached the latest Newsletter from the McCusker Alzheimer's Research Foundation, also for your perusal.

What Lions did for Sight when challenged by Helen Keller in 1925, Lions can do for Alzheimer's in 2015 the challenge is there.

We have a set up a Facebook page 'Alzheimer's Lions' which has a link to the McCusker Research page – please feel free to post your activities and experiences on the page so that Lions clubs across Australia can share what is being done.

Background to our Category B Project

The McCusker Alzheimer's Research Foundation (MARF) is a Category B Lions project which was passed at the Tamworth Convention in 2014. The MARF research facility will be part of the Sarich Neuro-Science building which will cost \$37 million to build. Mr Ralph Sarich of the Sarich orbital engine fame, has donated \$20 million towards the project. The remainder has come through donations from the four universities in Perth and the WA Lotteries commission. The amount we are seeking to raise is \$5 million for the research equipment needed and our goal is to raise the full \$5 million by asking all Lions clubs throughout Australia (about 1,250) to contribute an amount equivalent to \$200 per member over the next three years. (approx. \$66 per member per year).

ADVANCED LIONS LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE Auckland, New Zealand - September 8th -10th, 2015

Please pass on my sincere thanks to our District Governor and entire Cabinet Team for providing me with such an amazing experience and development opportunity.

Whilst there was considerable commitment to the completion of this course, I found all of the formal sessions to be both interesting and valuable to my ongoing development. I also gained considerable knowledge through the social interactions with many experienced Lions.

Please find a detailed report upon my training and commitment to development.

Pre-Assignments

- 1. Delegation This assignment involved identifying and writing about two life examples where delegation was successful and another where it could have been better.
- 2. Project Management This was a larger assignment and was a scenario based project involving a mock community and Lions Club. Completion of this task involved both Individual and group based activities culminating in the selection of a Club Project. Challenges included communication between syndicate members as my group had participants from other States within Australia and New Zealand
- 3. Developing the Lions Leaders of Tomorrow – Part 1 was based expanding our knowledge and understanding of the Global Leadership Team, Part 2 involved exploring the Leadership Resource Centre on the LCI Website and familiarizing ourselves with the resource materials available.

Institute - Auckland

I arrived in New Zealand late in the afternoon the day before ALLI commenced, and right from the time I arrived at the Convention Centre I had syndicate members waiting for me to arrive to work upon our selected project as per Pre- Assignment No. 2.

Each day formalized classes began at 8.30 am and finished at 6.00 pm with breaks for morning tea – Lunch and afternoon tea. Each evening we attended dinner together and upon completion

around 7.30pm our time was our own. I spent time at the bar each night getting to know other course participants and faculty members, sharing experiences and continued to informally learn more about Lions.


